Brambles Primary Academy

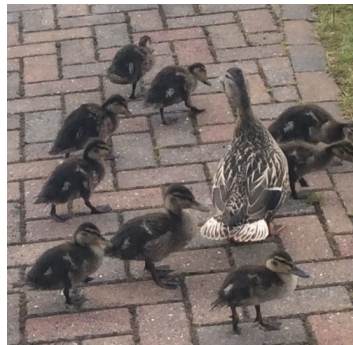

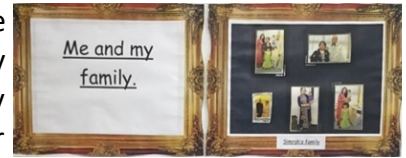

In the afternoon, all children who had been reading the books travelled to Inspire2Learn to take part in the ceremony. Each school had nominated individuals for awards, based on their commitment to reading, courage to try something new, curiosity in sharing ideas and asking questions, and finally care. As a result, the children are now ambassadors for reading in their academy.

After a superb celebration, the children learnt that the winner of TVEd Book of the Year 2019 was the incredible 'Armistice Runner' by Tom Palmer, a deserved winner for his thoughtful story of fell running, mixed with memories of World War I.



Keep on Reading...



Throughout the summer holidays, your involvement with reading activities at home, will have a huge impact not only on how well your child reads, their understanding of language and ability to express themselves, but also on how interested in and positive their attitude will be to reading when they return to school in September. Reading builds vocabulary, increases understanding and unlocks learning across all subjects so it is important that you continue to read with your child during the summer holidays. In doing this, you can help back up the learning they have acquired over the year and support their language and literacy skills. National Literacy Trust research has shown that children who read outside the classroom every day are five times more likely to read above the expected level for their age compared to children who never read outside class.

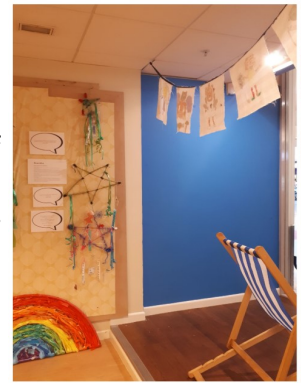
Most libraries are offering the 'Summer Reading Challenge' to children aged 5-11 throughout the school summer holidays. This year's theme is Space Chase to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the lunar landings. The challenge is for children to read six library books – when they join the challenge they will receive a mission folder and collect stickers and incentives along the way.

Brilliantly Boro

A new exhibition of pupil's visual art, created by all nine schools in the project led by Tees Valley Education, has been displayed in Middlesbrough's new creative space 'Brilliantly Boro' in the heart of the town. Creative Factory was set up by Middlesbrough Council to facilitate and strengthen creative opportunities as part of their wider 'Middlesbrough's Great Place Tees Valley' project. The brand new hub in the Hill Street Centre, Middlesbrough opened with the exhibition, which is on for the whole of July.



The Tees Valley Creative Learning Partnership (TVCLP) were asked to exhibit work from the project in the first ever exhibition displayed there, endorsing the shared passion to raise the perceived value of arts and culture.

Creative Factory puts artists and creative thinking at the core of its approach. It is committed to facilitating new opportunities for creatives in Middlesbrough, where artists are nurtured, developed and supported, contributing to the town's future. The TVCLP project, supported by the Paul Hamlyn Foundation, aims to support teachers and pupils in developing creative thinking through visual arts. The exhibition was shared widely at the Northern School of Art in June before being moved to the new hub in Middlesbrough.



This is a wonderful opportunity and it is hoped that the children and their parents will go and see the work. Having their creations displayed in this town centre location is so valuable and we hope that they feel proud of their contribution.

'Brilliantly Boro,' Creative Factory Hub is located in The Hill Street Centre, Middlesbrough until the end of July.

- ◆ **Care:** For ourselves, each other and our communities.

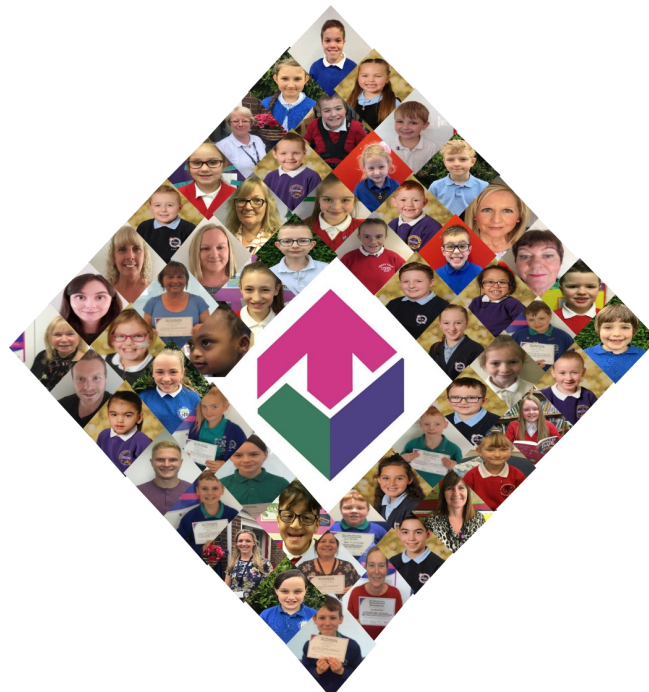
