

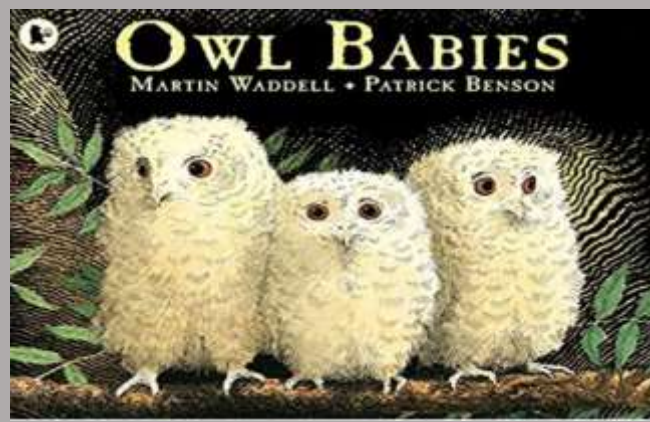


## Home Activities- Zahida & Shelia's Class- Week 13



### Story of the Week

A lovely story about three baby owls who wake up to find their mother is not home. Where could she be?

After the children have watched the story a few times you could ask them questions. For example:

- Where the owls live?
- What they like to eat?
- When do owls sleep?
- How did the baby owls feel?
- What are some differences between mother owl and her babies? ( feathers, mother hunts and babies stay at home)

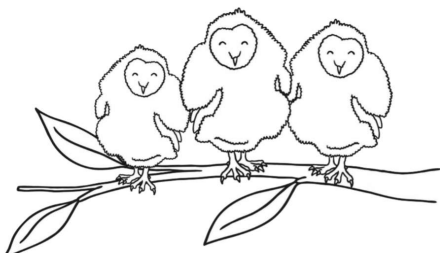

## Owl Baby Picture



You will need:

- Black and brown paper
- A little bit of white paint
- A clothes peg
- A craft pomp om
- Glue
- A black and white crayon or marker
- Something to trace round for the eyes, maybe a milk bottle top

The steps:

Draw a large oval on the black paper. Draw in pencil and go over with white crayon so it's more visible.

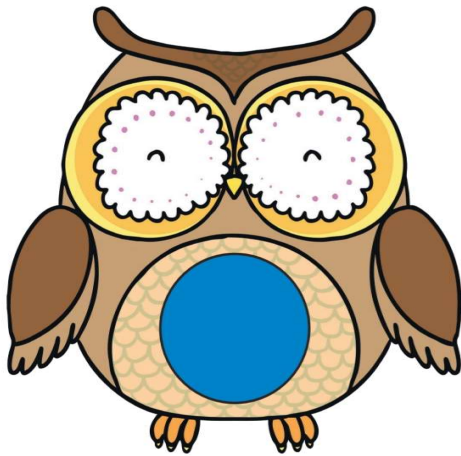
Clip the pom pom onto the peg. Next ask the children to dip the pom pom into the paint and dab it onto a paper plate before dabbing it onto the oval. Too much paint won't give the feathery look you want.

Finally cut out small circles from the brown paper for the eyes. Use the black marker for the pupils and stick them on.

I have added an activity that can be used to support children in colour and shape recognition.

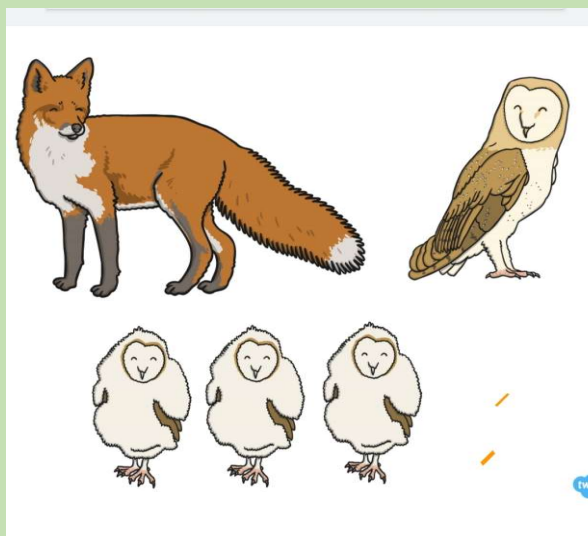
Cut the shapes out and ask the children to give each owl their own shape. See if they can name the shape and its colour. I have left the pink pentagon and purple hexagon, although they are tricky shapes it is worth talking about them and counting how many sides they have.

The children will enjoy acting out the story with these story pictures which you can cut out and stick on lolly sticks.




Encourage the children to talk about the characters and get them to chant repetitive line in the story 'I want my mummy'.






