Discovery Special Academy Secondary Phase Update



Funding Approved



Middlesbrough Council's executive has approved £6.2m of funding to support an extra 70 secondary school places for children with severe learning difficulties.

Mayor Andy Preston said that the Discovery Special Academy will be the "best facility of its kind for miles" and extending the site for older children will be "fantastic for the whole region."

Katrina Morley, chief executive of Tees Valley Education Trust, said:

"It's wonderful news that, through our work with the council and
Department for Education, we're able to extend to secondary aged
children the same opportunity that we currently offer to those of
primary age. During the consultation period, feedback from parents
and carers was overwhelmingly positive and this key decision will
support a range of families and the community across
Middlesbrough and surrounding areas for generations to come."
